Recent actions

Our petitions have been handed to Cathy McGowan (750 signatures) and Sussan Ley (780 signatures). A StopAdani banner was hung on St Matthew's Church in Albury, with Father Peter Macleod Miller's support.

Pressure from all quarters is working, with the ALP having won the Queensland election and vetoed the NAIF loan, Chinese banks have ruled out participation in the project and Downer is no longer building the mine. But Adani hasn't given up yet so we need to maintain the rage.
